## OUR BEST INVESTMENT

### My Family's MCS Story

I guess you could say our MCS story began years ago when I coached volleyball for a year at WMC - and the players could pray better than I could! At that time I said to my husband, 'Paul - we need to send our kids here some day!' Years later, we got to know some of the MCS families through sports and thought, 'What great kids these are!' This is a very genuine school and that's what we wanted for our kids. So we toured and then enrolled our kids at MCS.



It felt like a *huge* decision for us when we did it. For some other families who go here, Christian school is probably the norm - but for us, coming from public schools - it was something that we'd never done! We just really felt that God was prompting us. We kept running into people all summer from WMC and MCS.

We did have reservations at first. Should our kids be in a public school? Our kids are Christians and you're not supposed to hide from the world. But they aren't exactly 'salt and light' right now - they are growing, and it's hard to keep them in the faith. We do only have so long to pour into them in a meaningful way, and the school helps so much! They don't just have a religion class, the whole day revolves around our faith - and I'm surprised at how deep they go. I trust the teachers so much. I trust that the teachers are coming at issues from a Christian perspective. They go deep with the Bible, and my kids have a much better understanding of the Bible than what I had growing up - which is amazing! From an education standpoint, it's nice having smaller class sizes and having the teachers be such a meaningful part of my kid's lives. I'm so comfortable releasing my kids to them.

We love the Spanish Immersion program. We have a Blueberry farm, and having a language barrier with the staff means you can't connect with them very well. From being in this program, our son Carter can go and speak with the women in the packing shed. He connects them with our whole family. By having our son learn their language, they know that we respect their culture, and they light up being able to connect in this way. Carter can ask them how they are doing, if there are any problems, etc. This will be a gift to us going forward.

My kids have both really blossomed here, and we see them grow more and more all the time. *Really, what better thing can you invest in?*

## UNCONVENTIONAL MEASUREMENTS

Sure, we use rulers and other traditional measurement tools in our classrooms. But learning can be much more engaging - and fun - when our teachers explore subjects with a more unconventional approach.



In Maestra DeEsteva's Kindergarten class, students learn how we can use different units such as book lengths, straws, etc. to approximate the length of a larger object. They discovered that the walrus they painted was approximately 17 straws in length, which is also about three Kindergarteners long!



In Mr. Bonnema's 5th Grade class, measurement becomes a little more complicated and sophisticated. Students were asked to determine how many possible outfits Mr. DeKam could have with 4 different shirts and pants. As you can see, it can be fun to turn Mr. DeKam into a math problem. *Which is your favorite?*

## A NOTE FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR

When most of us consider our career path, we focus on making a living for our families, what we enjoy doing, and where we feel God is calling us to make a difference in the world. Working at MCS has been all of those things for me. What has been surprising is what a blessing MCS has been to me. I have been blessed to partner with:

- Wonderful, caring teachers who sincerely love the children in their classrooms. I have been blessed to witness the way they support each other and give every effort to serve the families who have entrusted them with their children. I have met with them regularly to pray for the school, the children and each other as we carry out the work God has blessed us with.
- Board members and others who volunteer their time and expertise for almost no recognition.
- Parents who are dedicated to raising children to know and love the Lord and who sacrifice deeply to send their children to MCS.

And I have witnessed the tremendous support we receive from the great cloud of supporters who give to the school to support those families who cannot afford the full cost of tuition (like mine). 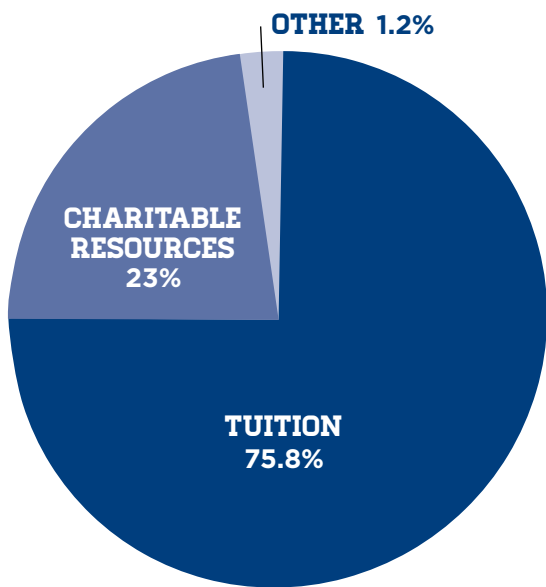
# BY THE NUMBERS

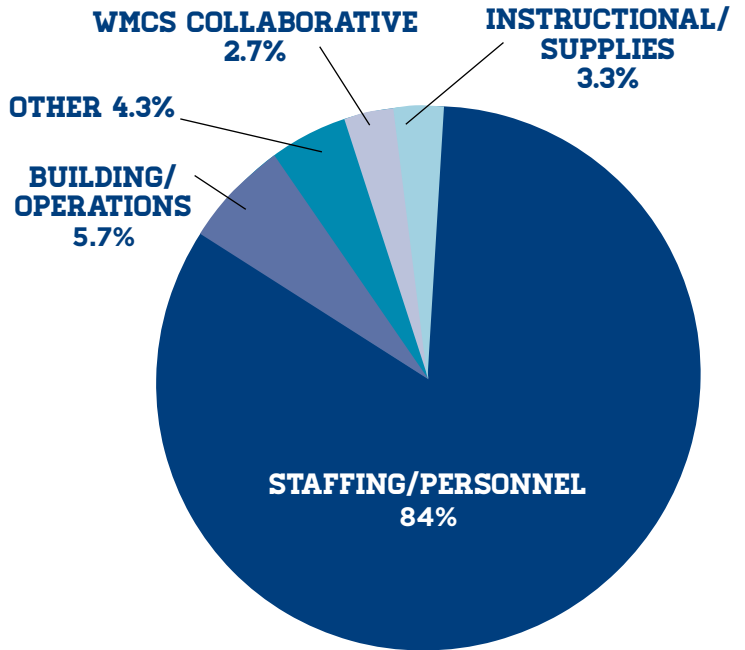

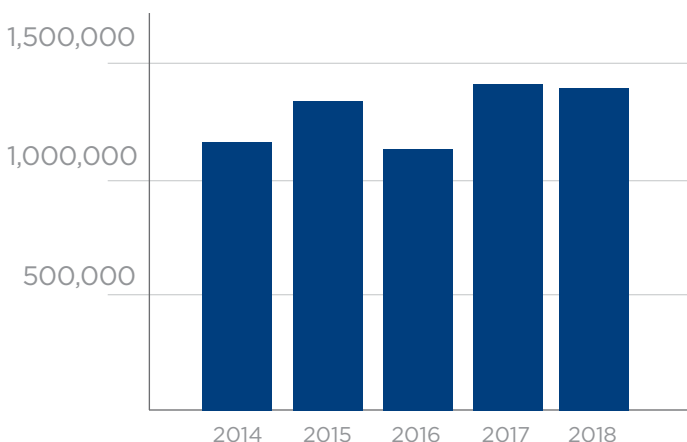

## SI TEACHER'S TRANSLATION WINS AWARD

When Pilar first heard author Mary Morgan read her book “The Runaway Lawnmower” to our students in March of 2017, she

had no idea of the journey that would follow. “As I was listening, I thought “This is a beautiful story. I think it should be translated into Spanish”, shares 1st grade Spanish Immersion teacher Pilar Vanderstelt. Pilar approached Mary afterward and shared this idea with her. A couple of months later, Mary called up Pilar and asked her if she would be willing to translate the book. “I loved the idea! I started to work on translating this story about a lawnmower that escapes a garage to make happy faces in neighbor’s lawns. The story teaches that happiness comes from doing nice things for others”. Translating the children’s book was not as

simple as it might sound. “There were unique challenges. In Spanish, every object is either female or male – but what gender is a lawnmower? And you can’t just translate word for word – you have to capture the meaning of each page.” The Spanish version was printed in the summer of 2017, and the publisher liked it enough to submit Pilar’s translation for a Moonbeam Children’s Book Award. Pilar’s translation *La Desenfrenada Podadora de Césped* won the Gold award for a Spanish Language Book!

“This has inspired me to do more translation work in the future and eventually write my own books”, Pilar confides. We’re thrilled to have teachers like Pilar at MCS sharing their unique gifts with us and others.



## SNOW CAN'T STOP THE TOTAL TREK QUEST TEAM

It’s snowing out early on a Saturday morning in November. Most people wouldn’t be excited to be getting ready to run with a group of preteen boys in the cold and snow – but then, Lis Potts and Mary LePage aren’t ‘most people’. Soon they were running with a group of 3rd to 5th grade MCS boys who they had been mentoring through the *Total Trek Quest (TTQ)* program since September. “We agreed to help out because we know how impactful this program can be”, Lis and Mary shared.

*Total Trek Quest* is an after school program that combines the physical activity of training for a 5K run with a curriculum that focuses on building strong social bonds, setting and reaching goals, and making healthy choices.
